a monster.

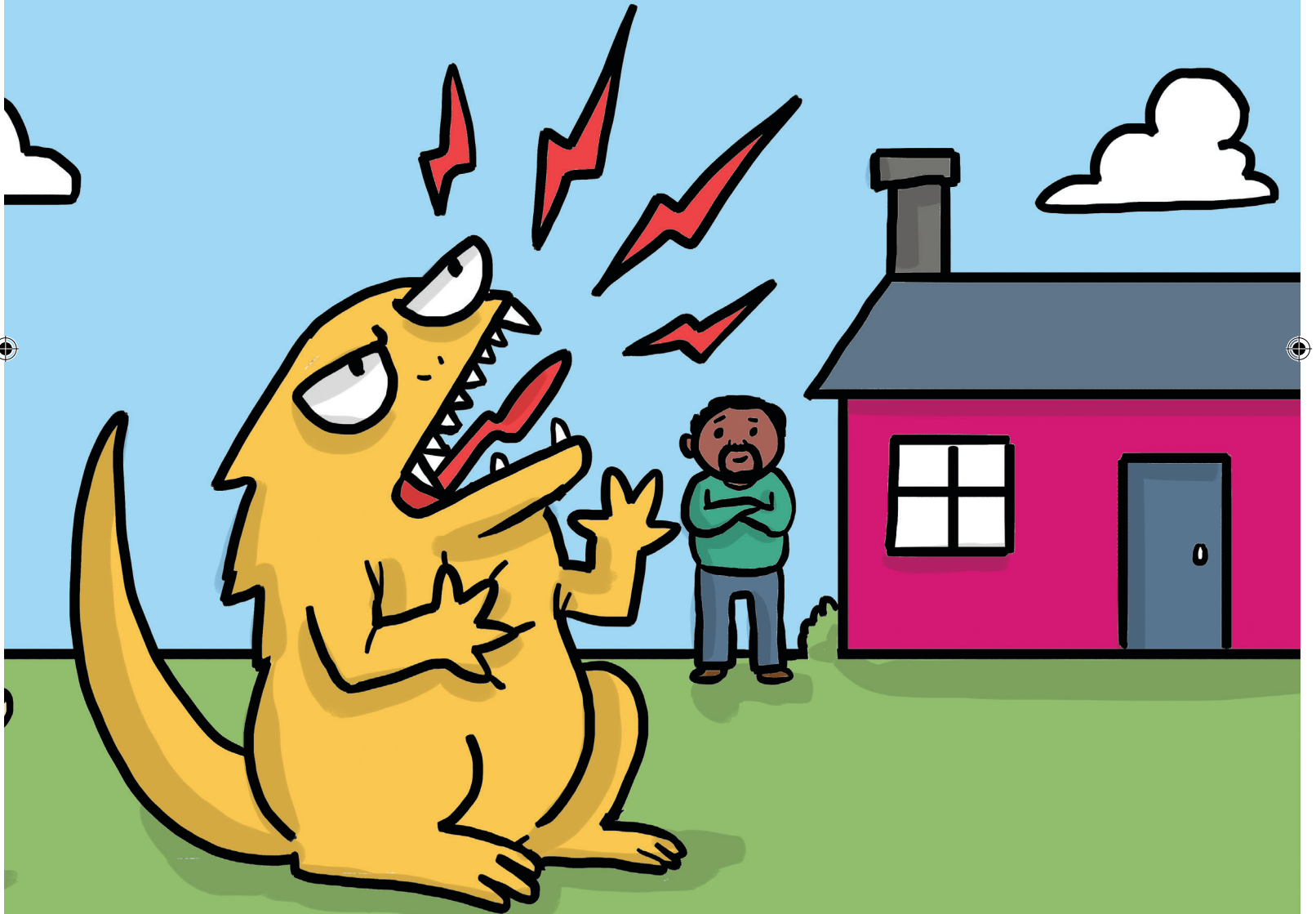




That's okay, because Lwando is a

angry.

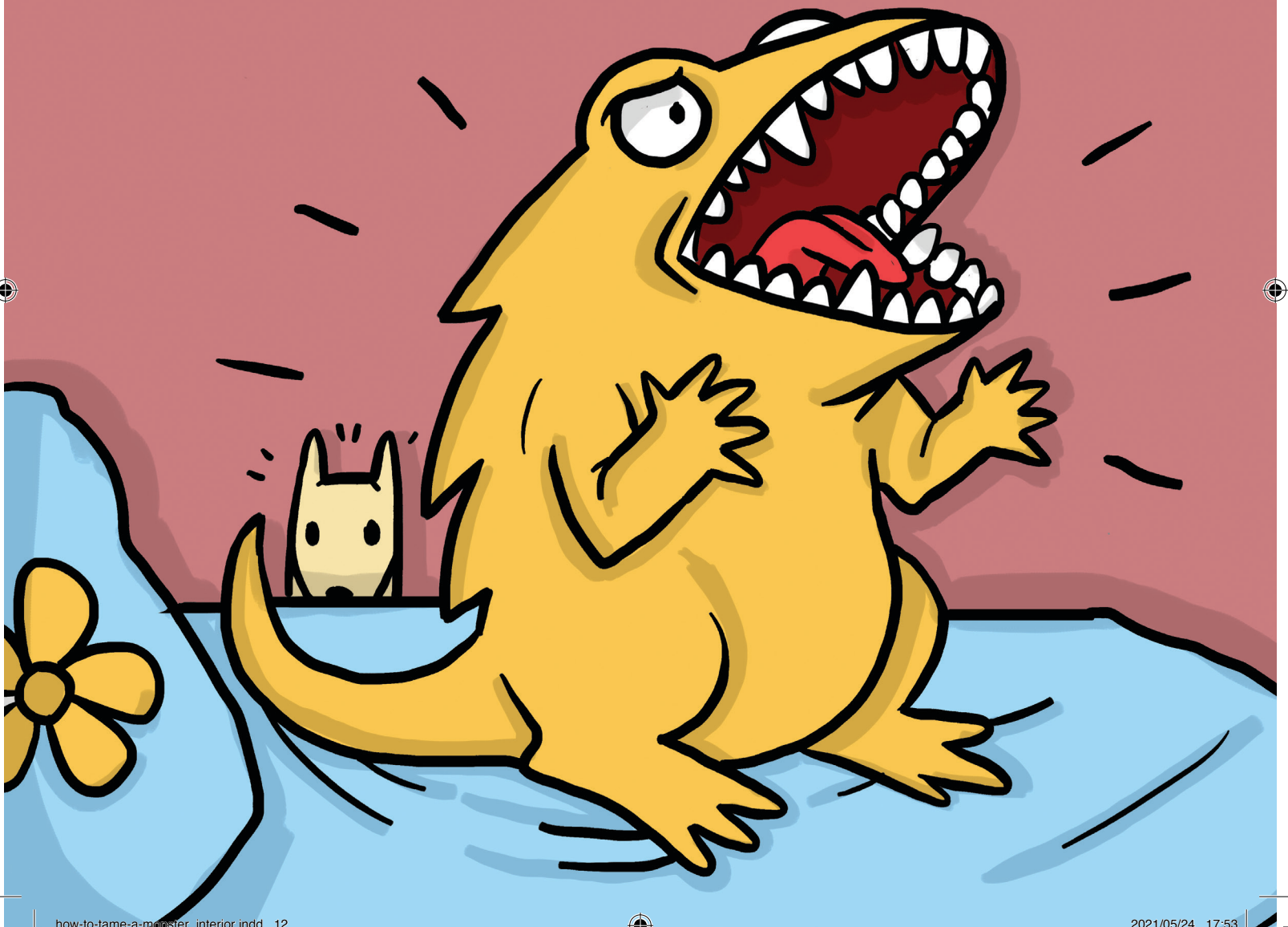


But Lwando knew she was just

tired.

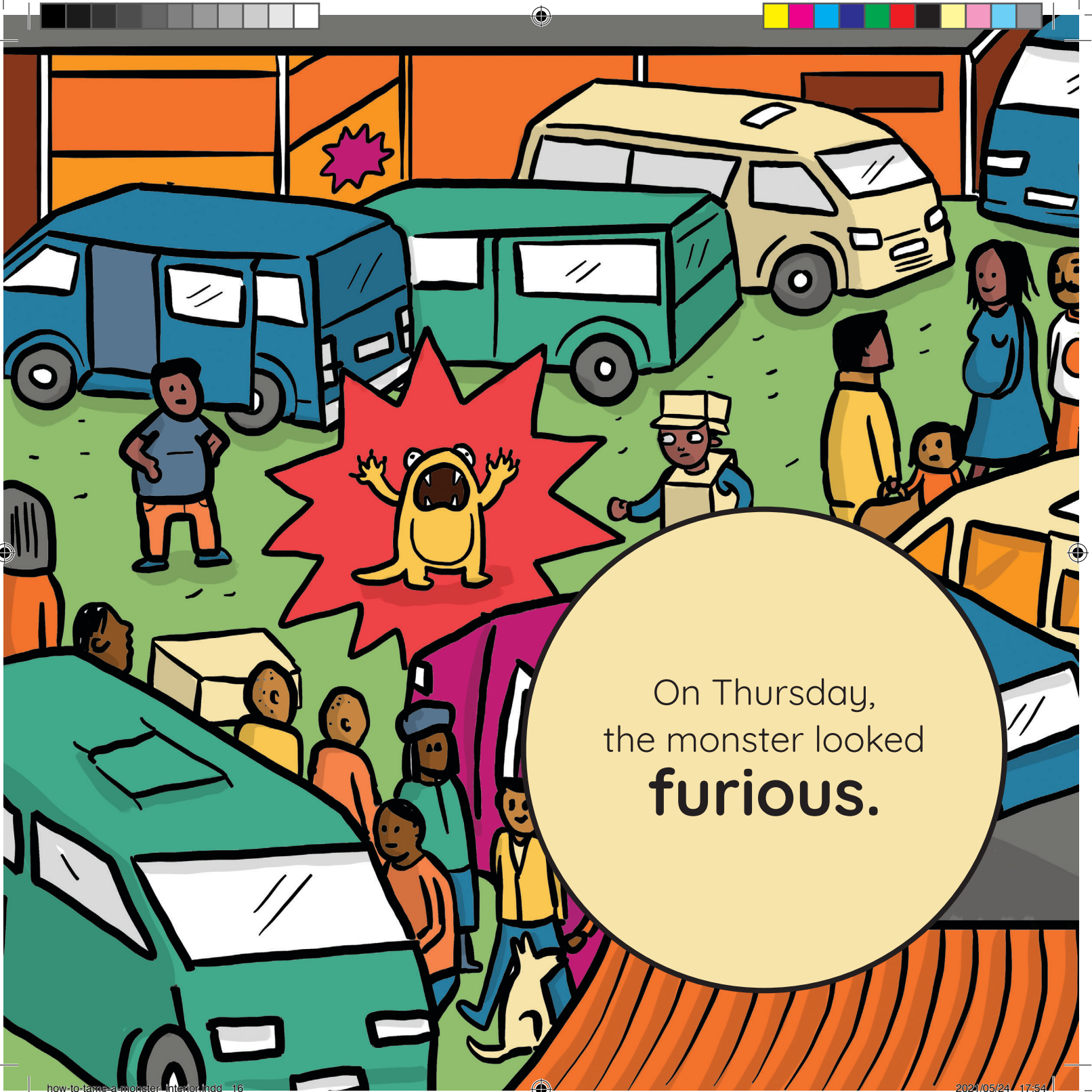


On Wednesday,

quiet.



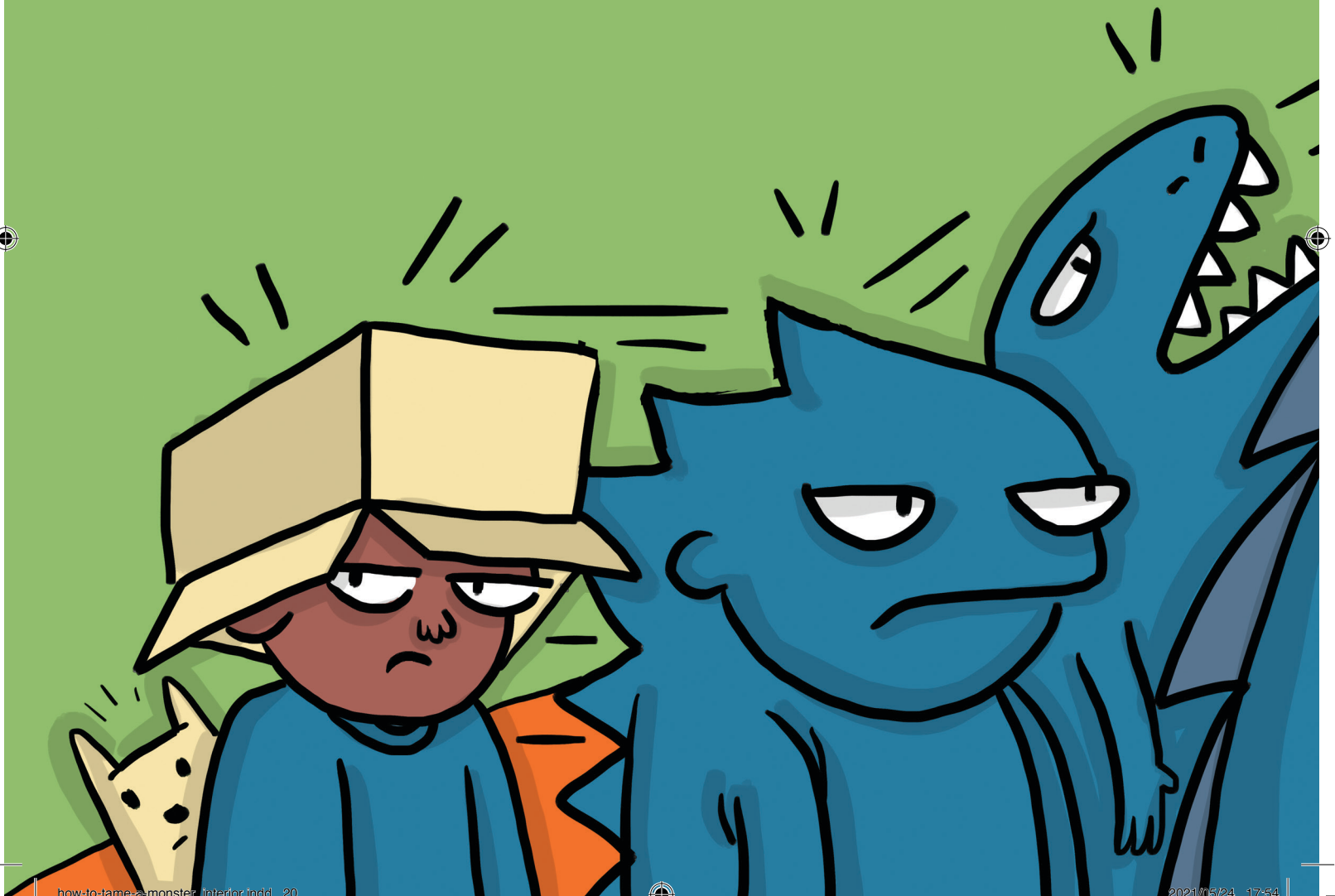
But on Friday,
nothing worked.

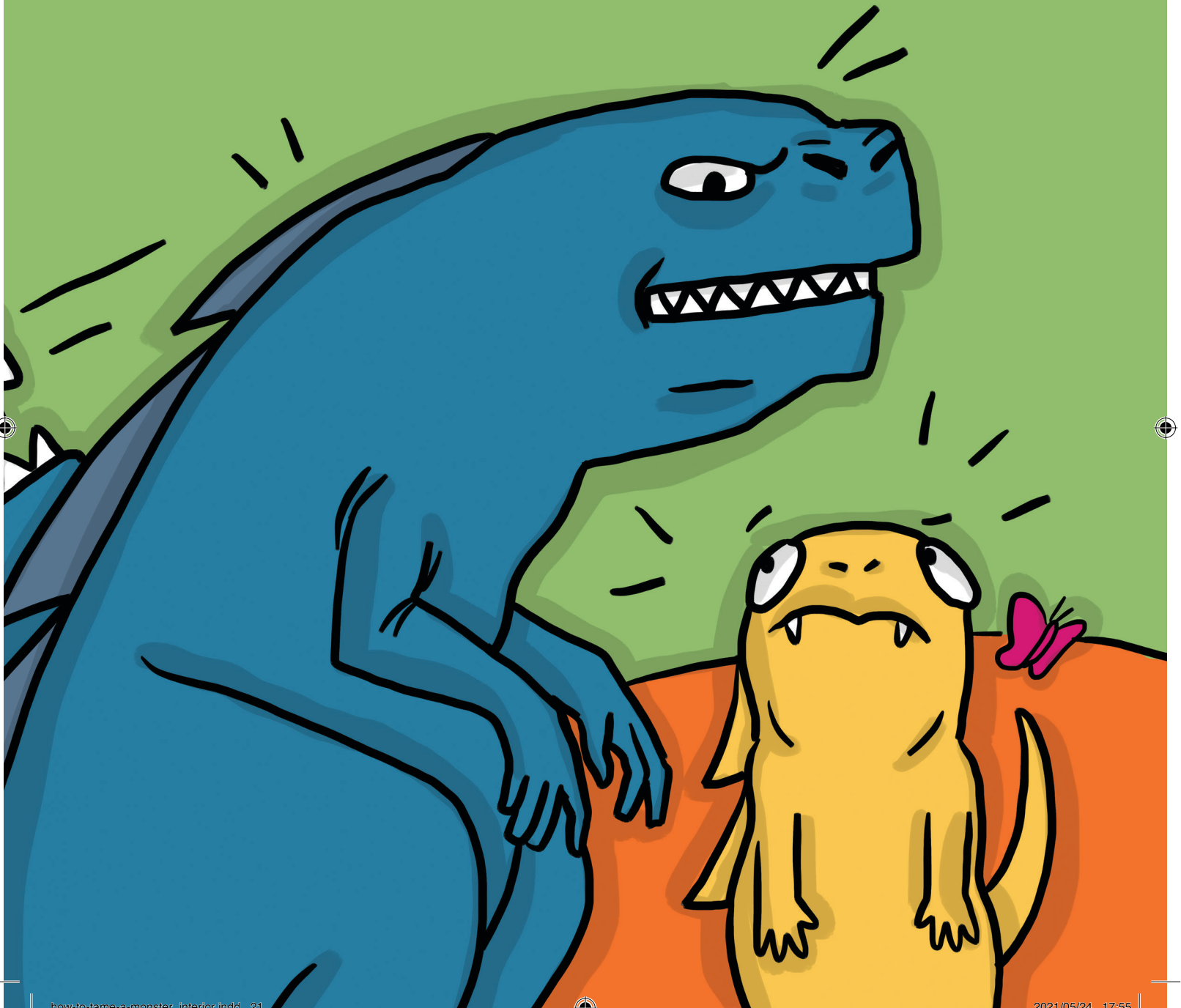






Then there were **two** monsters.





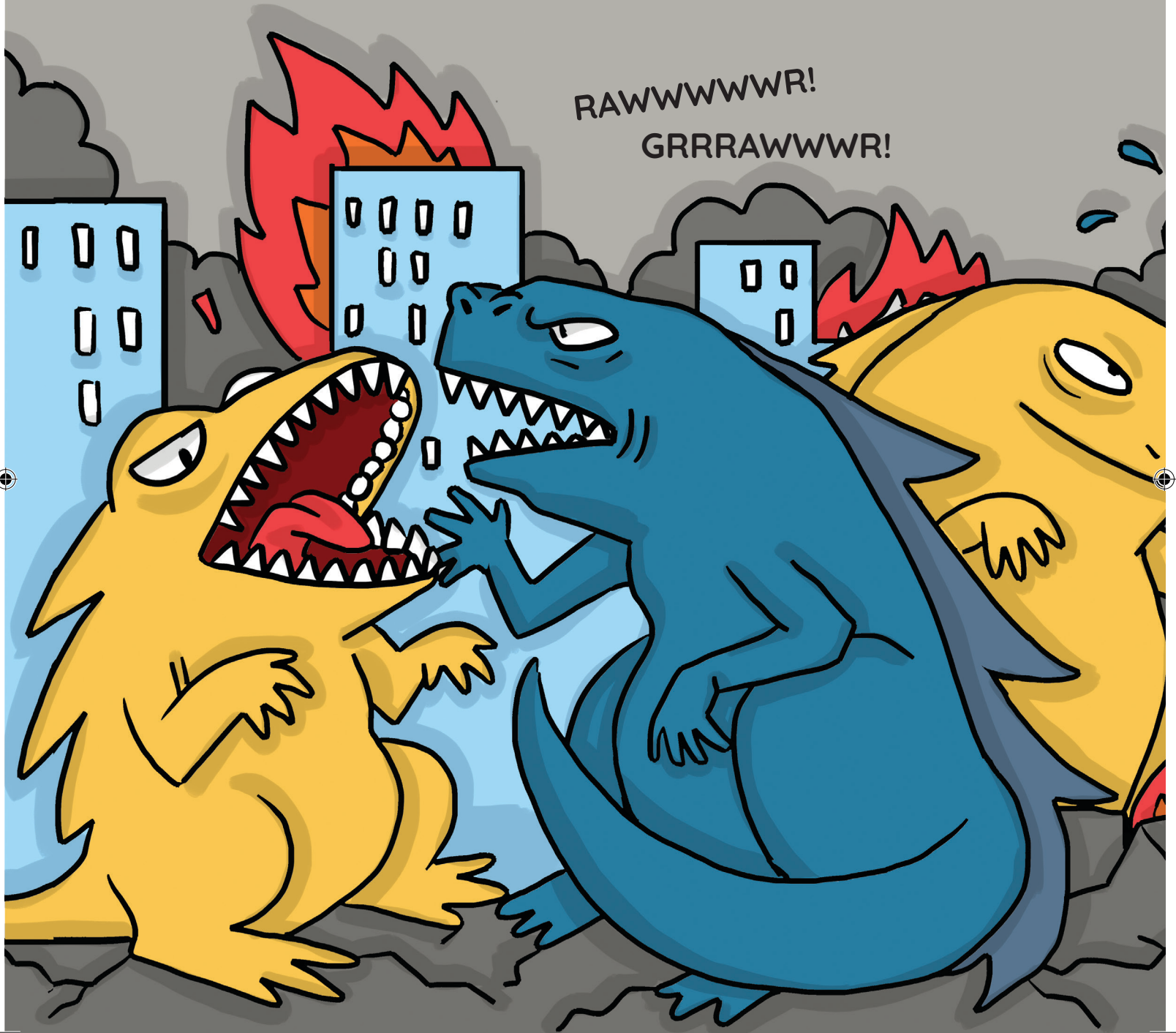
The monsters got **bigger**.

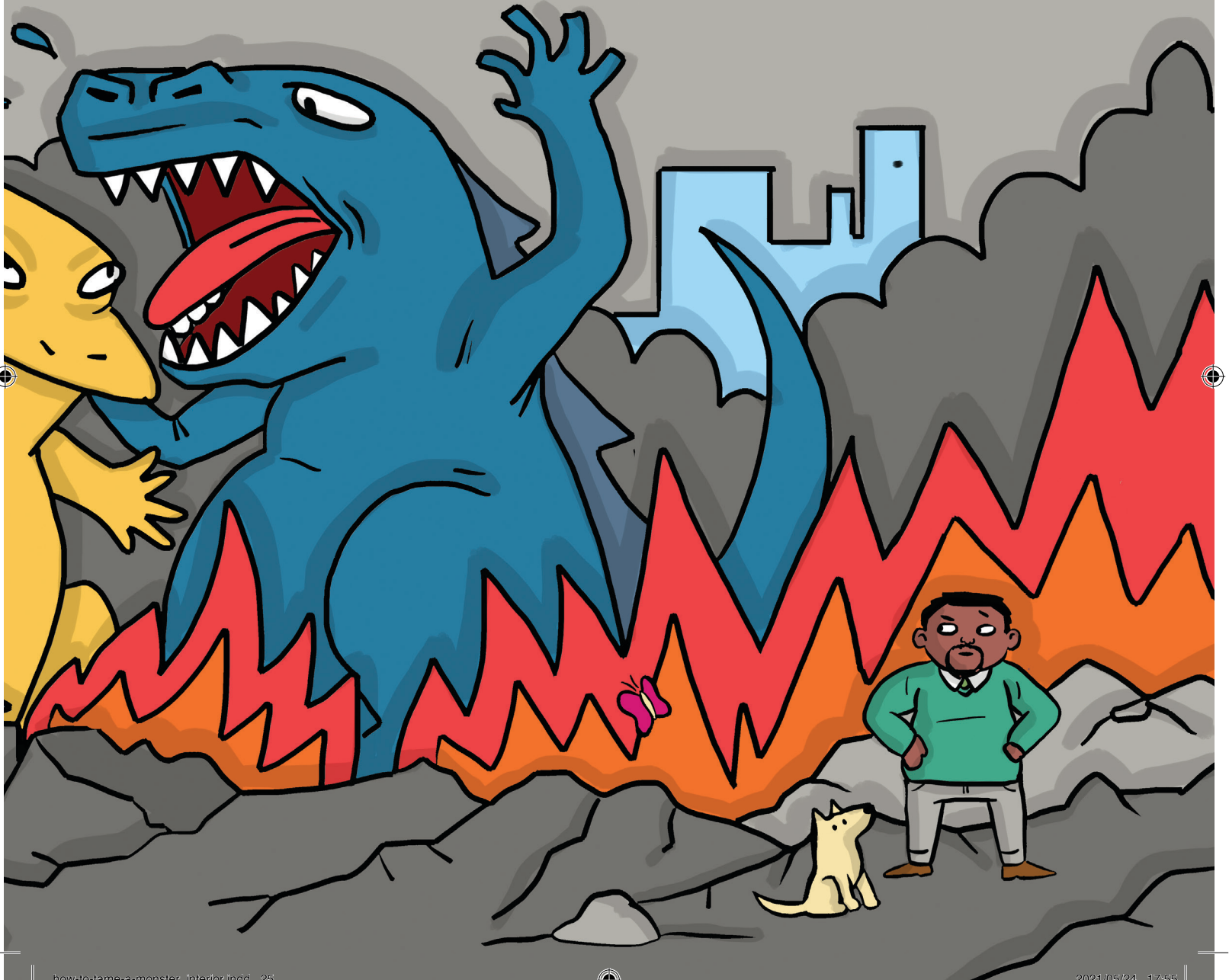

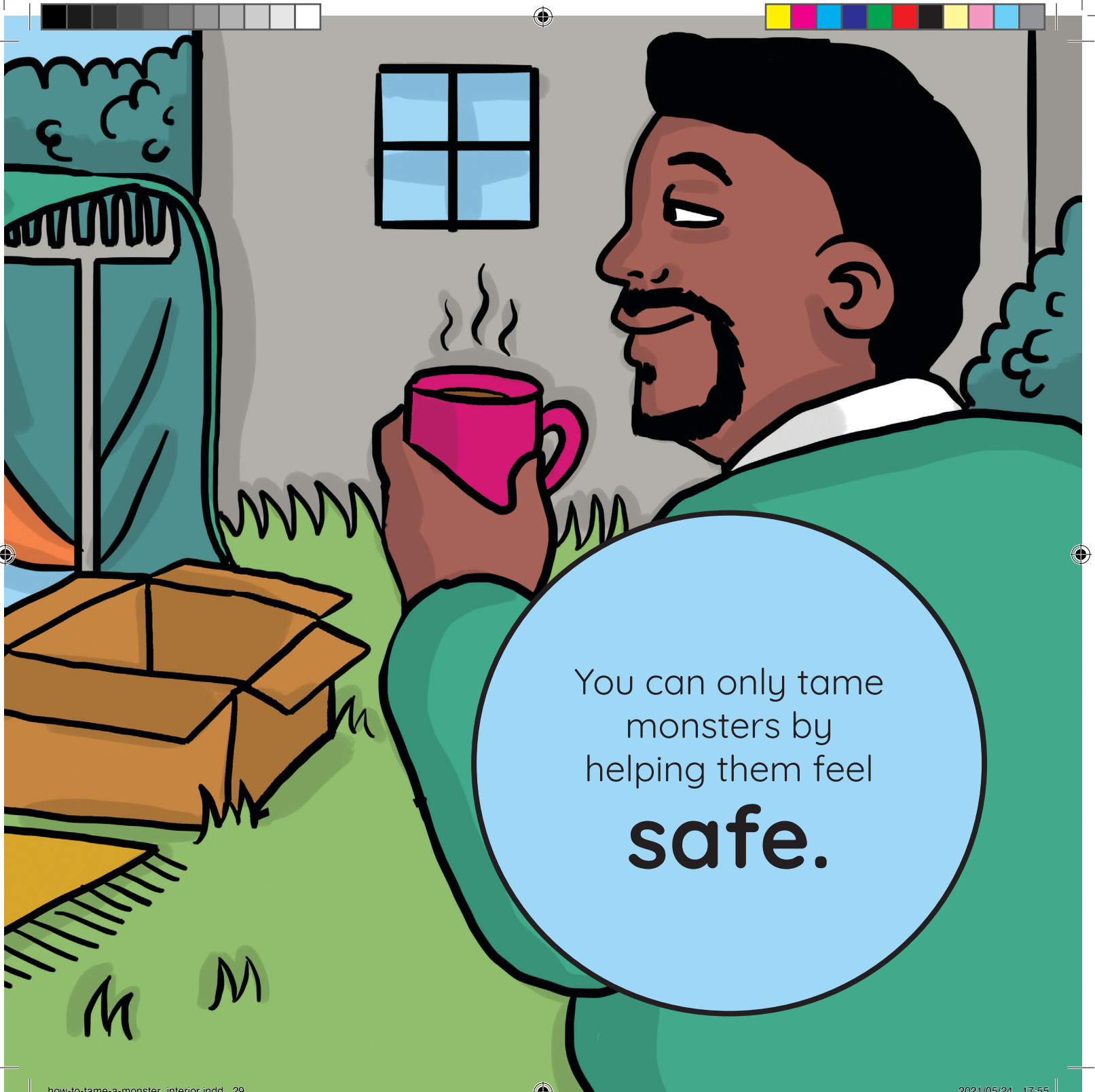
Luckily, Dad is the best monster tamer of all.
