

Why is there a hole in the wall?

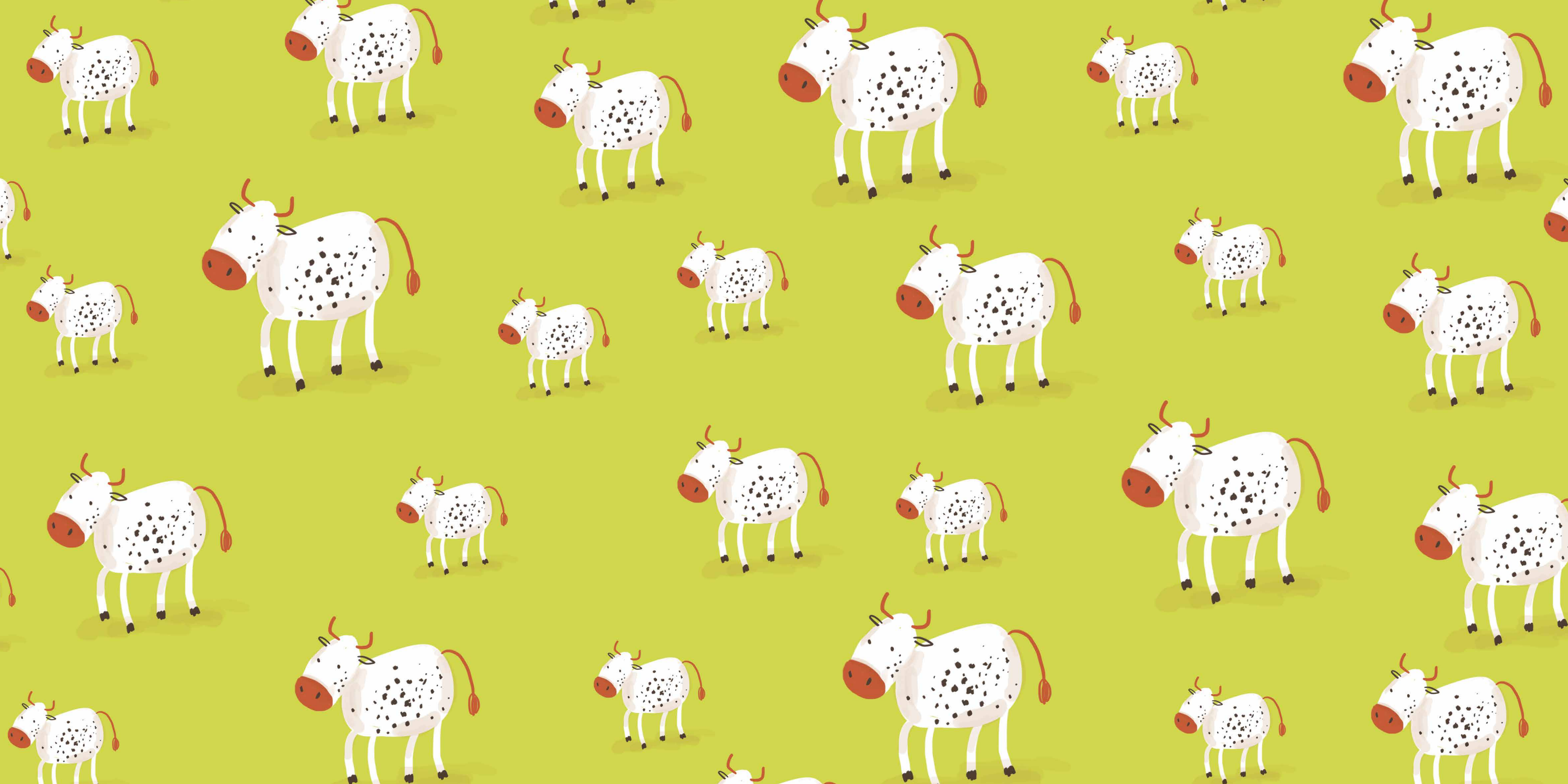


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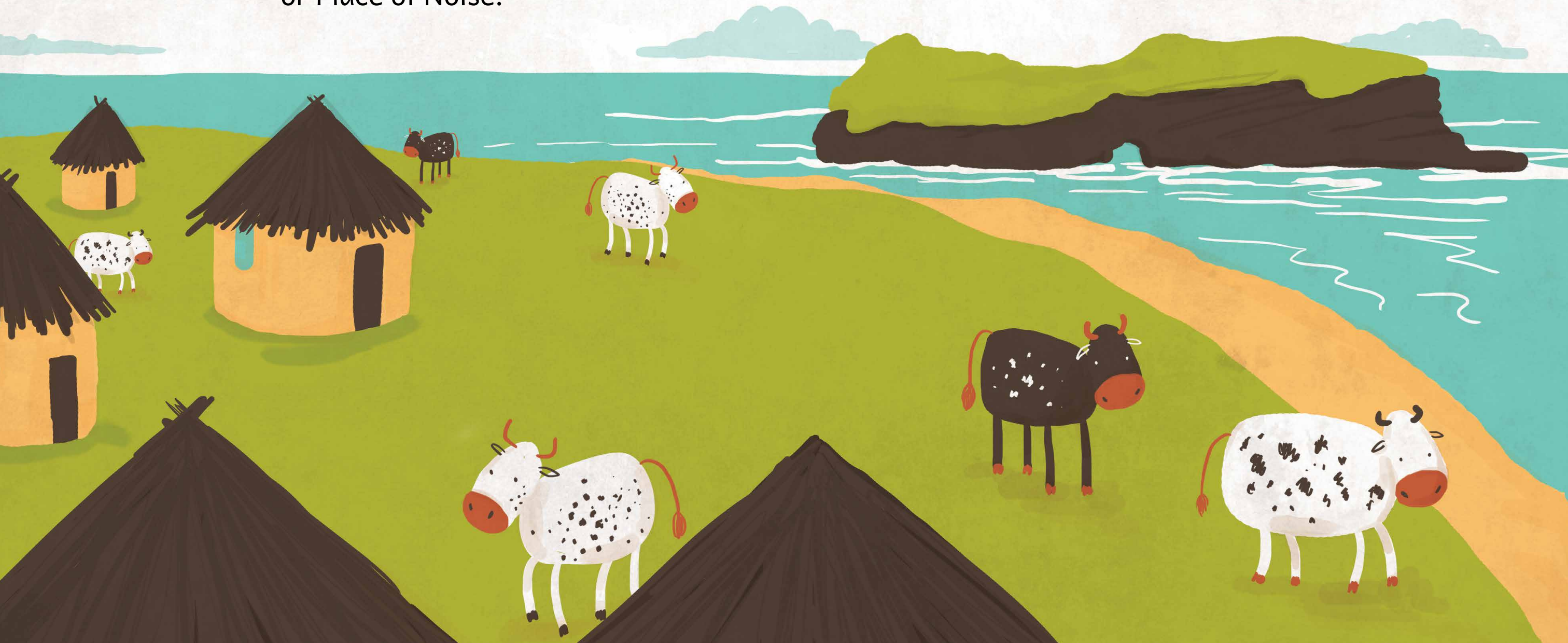
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Lungisa lived in a village called esiKhaleni

Some people also called it Hole-in-the-Wall.



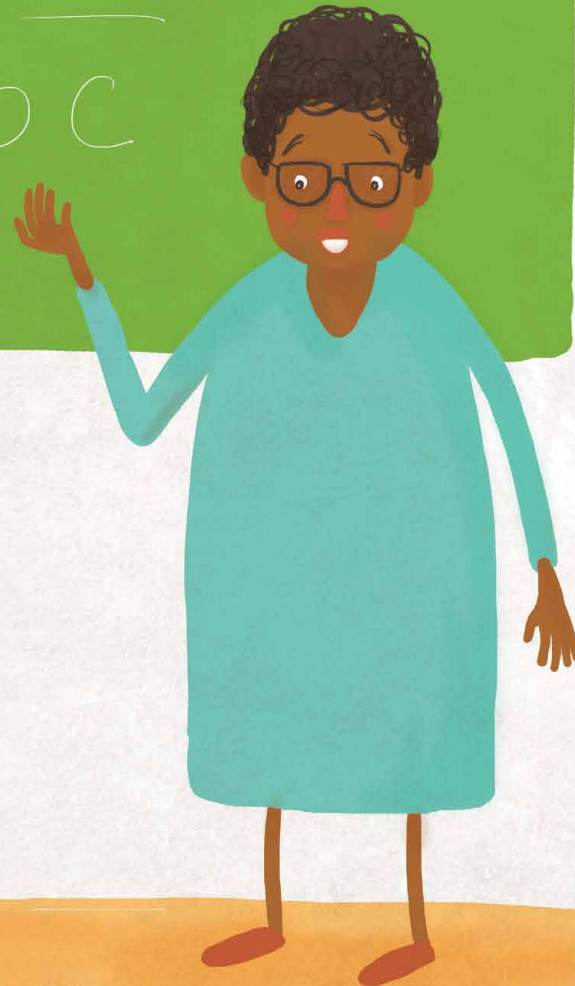
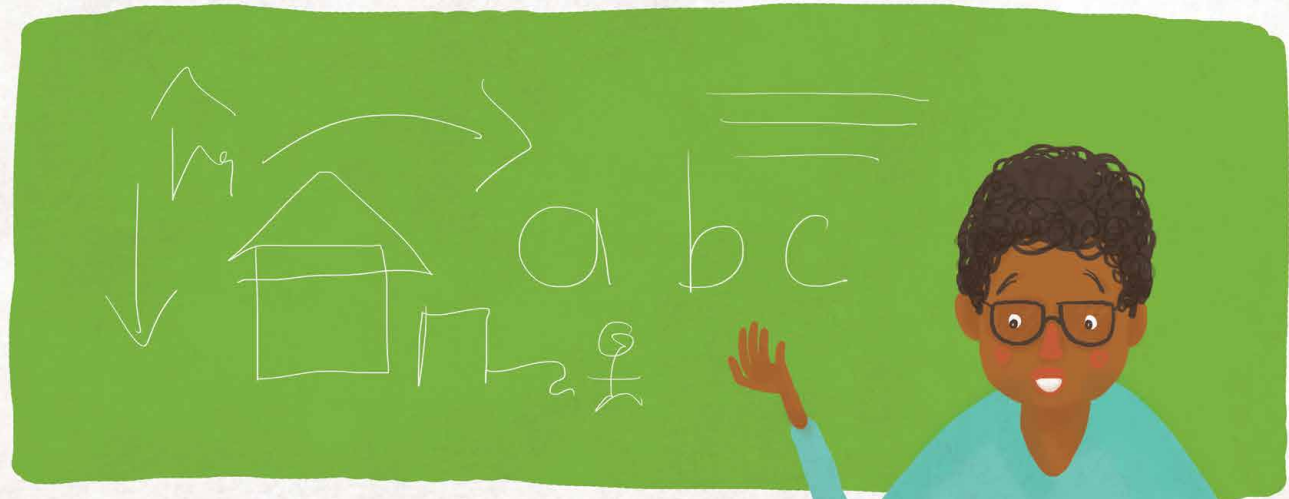
“Why is there a hole in the wall?”
